# Having purpose inspires and unites us.

Purpose gives us energy. Being clear about our ambition helps turn that energy into positive results for the bears and the community. In 2024, we continued to implement the current Strategic Plan while focusing on providing education in a variety of ways. The Gleaning Project, for example, educated fruit tree owners about fruit as a bear attractant and provided over 1,100 lbs of fruit to the community. Additionally, we were able to engage with residents through events such as Bear Awareness Day and the Farmers Markets, reaching a large audience with valuable education.

There were instances of property damage and numerous reports of bears exhibiting habituated behaviors like showing little fear of humans or their honking horns. Most of these incidents of aggressive interactions and property damage, were linked to bears having easy access to garbage, compost, or fruit.

In 2024, the City of Revelstoke ordered new garbage trucks to handle residential compost material marking a significant step forward in our goal to implementat bear-resistant garbage and compost bins in Revelstoke. As this initiative takes shape, we will continue collaborating with the City to ensure the proper use of these bins and provide ongoing education.

2024's major focus was continuing to provide education to the residents and visitors of Revelstoke. Revelstoke Bear Aware's education program continues to evolve as we work to become a Bear Smart Community.

### Conservation.

In 2024, there were 182 reports regarding bears made to the Report All Poachers and Polluters (RAPP) hotline or to Revelstoke Bear Aware.

3 black bears were killed as a result of habituation to garbage.

9 reports of damage to property.

**5** reports of aggression towards humans.

4 reports of livestock/pets killed or injured.

1 report of a Grizzly Bear in a residential area.

Revelstoke Bear Aware encourages reporting of all bear sightings or encounters to the RAPP hotline and / or to Revelstoke Bear Aware so that measures can be taken to reduce bear attractants in the ares and those bears can be monitored.

# Bear In Area Signs.

Bear in Area lawn signs were again deployed to areas where bear activity was reported. Signs were deployed at 35 locations during the season for an average of 5 days each.

Sign placement is based on reports from the residents of Revelstoke to:

- 1. Let people know where bears are active.
- 2. Remind people to secure bear attractants in the immediate area of bear foraging.





# Door-to-Door and Garbage Tagging.

In 2024, Revelstoke Bear Aware focused door-to-door and garbage tagging on small localized problem areas around the city.



Volunteers, working with the Education Coordinator, placed informational stickers on garbage cans left out the night before garbage pickup days. There were eight garbage tagging initiatives during the 2024 bear season.

The program showed positive results with a noticeable decrease in the amount of garbage left out as the fall season approached, when bear activity typically increases.



## Online Materials.

Our website is continually updated to provide timely and relevant information. You'll find details on upcoming RBAS events, a variety of educational resources, and a wealth of Revelstoke-specific content—all designed to support and inspire ongoing bear-smart engagement within our community.



We also provide up to the minute reports of bear sightings or encounters through our social media channels.



Revelstoke Bear Aware delivered its message through a variety of initiatives in 2024, including letters and pamphlets at the Revelstoke Visitor Information Centre, notice boards, at **B&Bs**, local businesses, and distributed directly to households.

A major highlight of 2024, was the completion of a RBAS-specific illustrated activity book for the Cub Crew program.

## Top 5 tips for being bear safe



Keep your garbage locked inside until collection morning, or use bear resistent bins



When recreating outdoors, secure all food, garbage & scented products.



Don't use bird feeders when bears are active, & store petfood & livestock food securely indoors.



Clean bbqs, grills & smokers thoroughly after every use.



Harvest all ripe fruit & windfalls. Manage compost properly. Use electric fences for livestock.

Local Events and Youth Program.

Revelstoke Bear Aware personnel attended 12 Farmer's Markets and provided 8 in-class and summer camp presentations in 2024.

Bear Awareness Day was held in September 2024. It was fun and educational for residents and visitors alike.

We continued to run the Burger Challenge, too.





The Gleaning Project.

Through the Gleaning Project, surplus fruit and nuts are removed from the community to help reduce bear attractants. Residents with excess fruit or nuts on their trees are encouraged to contact Revelstoke Bear Aware to arrange for volunteers to harvest it. Volunteers may keep a portion of the fruit, and the rest is donated to the Community Connections Food Bank and the Food Recovery Program.

Any rotten fruit collected from the ground is given to local farmers for pig feed, making this a zero-waste initiative.

In 2024, there continued to be a focus on community planning. Revelstoke remains committed to becoming a Bear Smart Community. Part of that goal requires implementation of a bear-resistant garbage solutions.

Revelstoke Bear Aware would like to thank
Steve Black, the Director of Engineering and
Public Works at the City of Revelstoke for his
hard work in advancing this important
initiative.

In 2024, the City of Revelstoke ordered new garbage trucks, that will accommodate residential bear-resistant compost and garbage bins. This is a significant step towards preventing human-bear conflicts. Revelstoke Bear Aware is optimistic that this program will roll out in the fall of 2026.

Communities with bear-resistant waste programs have seen remarkable reductions in human-bear conflicts. The Revelstoke Bear Aware Society is excited to see similar success here. We look forward to working closely with the City of Revelstoke to provide education on the new system as the program rolls out.
